Words that I suspect we will sing at least once as we journey through this season of Advent.

St Theresa of Avila once said: "It's not with many thoughts or words that He hears us but in the silence of our longing." But what is it that we're longing for? When we sing those words of Charles Wesley what is going through our minds? Is it thoughts of all that preparation we still need to do to put food on the Christmas table and presents under the tree? Is it anticipation of the almost magical element of the festive season, the things we missed out on last year – beautiful lights, evocative music, children's faces captivated by everything from decorations, to Santa Claus, to the nativity play? Is it a sentimentality that comes from the image of an innocent baby? Or the deep pain of the realization that someone close won't be with you this Christmas? Advent hymns and Christmas carols perhaps more than most other church music can stir our emotions, our memories, our 'feel good factor'. But how seriously do we really take the message that their words bring?

'Come, thou long-expected Jesus' is anticipating more than the birth of a fragile baby whose first bed was a manger. This baby came to set God's people free, a victory he won through death on a cross. An act of such total and infinite love that it releases us from our fears and sins and enables us to find rest, peace, in the Lord our God. But that can only happen when we let go of our inbuilt securities and comfort zones and let the Babe of Bethlehem into our hearts. And, once there, we must allow him to grow, to become the adult Jesus who teaches and challenges and guides us to the things of his world and not ours. Then, and only then, will we discover the true depth and meaning of the Christmas story.

The turkey and the cards and the tinsel are part of what this time of year is for us, but amidst the hustle and bustle I encourage you this Advent to find some time each day to contemplate the significance of the words 'Come, thou long-expected Jesus', and to reflect in the silence of your own longing what that may mean in your life. And I pray that we will each come to Christmas Day with a yearning desire to welcome the Christ child, and all that he offers, into our hearts and lives in a fresh and powerful way.

<u>Biblical Who's Who</u> – the lesser known characters of the Bible and what they have to say to us today.

THEOPHILUS

Chapter 1 of Luke's gospel contains many words that we will hear read this Advent and Christmas season. The visit to Mary by the angel Gabriel, Mary's journey to see her cousin Elizabeth, and, of course, the emotive words of The Magnificat. What we probably won't hear is the introduction to Luke's gospel – 'I also have decided to write a careful account for you, most honourable Theophilus, so you can be certain of the truth of everything you were taught.' Luke 1: 3-4 NLT

Theophilus was evidently a friend of Luke and a fellow believer. The name Theophilus literally means 'one who loves God.' For Luke to have addressed this gospel and, indeed, the Acts of the Apostles, to his friend suggests that Theophilus wanted to know about what God was doing in the world through the lives of others and how that might impact on his life.

I wonder what you and your friends talk about? The weather, sports, our families? But how often do you talk about God and his work in the world and your life? God shouldn't be a taboo subject or a private matter. If we consider Jesus to be our friend then he's part of our friendship network and that means talking of him as we do our other friends. And what better time of year to do that then now when we are thinking about Jesus' birth - without which we wouldn't be wrapping presents, planning meals, writing cards and sending greetings.

Talking of our friend Jesus should be something we do naturally and it isn't about trying to convert others or to make them like him. It's simply mentioning someone, and something, that is significant to you and is part of who you are. You may be surprised to discover that your friends are actually interested enough in you to want to know more about what is important to you.


